n September 2024 Local 302 staff attended the 79th Convention of the Western Conference of Operating Engineers held in Tacoma, Washington. This is an opportunity for delegates to receive updates from IUOE leadership, political representatives, and topic experts.

You'll read broader IUOE highlights in District 4 Representative Sean Jeffries' report on page 15. I also wanted to share the Local 302 specific updates provided by Jacob H. Black, In-House Local 302 Counsel, Recording-Corresponding-Financial Secretary and Sean Jeffries, President and District 4 Representative:

- Currently, we are waiting on a ruling from the United States Court of Appeals, for the District of Columbia Circuit to require Virginia Transformer Corporation to bargain a first contract for approximately 200 people in the unit

Expanding the Snoqualmie Casino Hotel and Valet Garage

ocated approximately 30
minutes east of Seattle, the
Snoqualmie Casino is tucked
away across a 57-acre property on
a sloping hillside surrounded by
evergreen Douglas firs.

The existing entertainment and casino facility opened in 2008 with a 185,000 square foot, two story casino building and a six-level parking structure. The casino building contains multiple gaming oppor-

tunities, a sportsbook, a premier concert venue, and several dining facilities.

A \$400 million multi-phase expansion is currently underway surrounding the existing complex.

This expansion will add a 10-story hotel immediately adjacent to the existing casino building, as well as a below-grade valet garage and tunnel to the south.

It will include an expanded gaming floor, destination spa, a 2,000-seat entertainment and convention center, and restaurants. The completed expansion is scheduled to open in 2025.

Local 302 members have fulfilled utilities, dirt work, piles, shoring system, road construction, retaining wall systems, and all crane work for this project.











Mount Vernon's massive new library is a 'national model' for rural development

he \$61 million Mount Vernon Library Commons is a mixeduse project that began construction in September of 2022, and is estimated to be open to the public by January 2025.

Local 302 operators fulfilled all the dirt and foundation work, concrete paving, and tower crane work for the project.

The project includes a public library, a community conference center, a commercial kitchen, and three floors of structured parking to support commerce and development in the downtown area. The project is the largest municipally owned

Electric Vehicle (EV) charging station in the United States.

Drivers who have historically driven past Mount Vernon on I-5, can now stop to eat and shop while charging their vehicle in one of the 76 chargers, four of which are Direct Current fast-charging stations. Nine electric bicycle-charging lockers are also available to commuters.

Also, because of the garage's proximity to Skagit Station, people will be able to park and either catch the bus or train to their final location.

The environmentally thoughtful project is the first publicly-bid proj-

ect in Washington state to achieve "Passive House" certification and yields 80 percent less energy usage than the current city library, which was built in the 1950's.


The project was funded entirely by federal, state, and local resources without increasing local property taxes. Federal funding sources included a \$12.5 million Charging & Fueling Infrastructure Grant from President Joe Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and a \$26.8 million Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act Transit-Oriented Development loan from the Department of Transportation.

Local 302 advocates for Olympic Peninsula member jobs, tackles traffic issues By Eric Arntson, District 3 Representative

Local 302 always keeps an eye towards the future, observing community needs, and initiating conversation with leaders to get projects off the ground.

Here are three examples on the Olympic Peninsula.

Hood Canal Bridge — infrastructure needed to address travel demands

he Hood Canal Bridge (officially William A. Bugge Bridge) is a floating bridge that carries

State Route 104 across Hood Canal in Puget Sound and connects the Olympic and Kitsap Peninsulas. At 7,869 feet in length (floating portion 6,521 feet), it is the longest floating bridge in the world located in a saltwater tidal basin, and the third longest

floating bridge overall.

It opened in 1961 and since then, it has become a vital link for residents, freight haulers, commuters, and recreational travelers. The convenience it provides has had a major impact on economic development, especially in eastern Jefferson County.

The Hood Canal Bridge currently sees a significant amount of traffic daily. On average, about 15,000 vehicles cross the bridge each weekday, and this number increases to around

19,000 vehicles on weekends.
Local 302 continues to advocate for a plan to address increasing demands that are placed on the Hood Canal Bridge and the surrounding areas.
This infrastructure work would help the community and bring jobs to Local 302 membership.

Currently, there are no plans to expand the Hood Canal Bridge, but this is a great example of how Local 302 is forward-thinking to better our communities and line up jobs for membership.



Gorst SR3/SR16 Corridor **Project receives initial** funding

group of diverse community partners came together to form the Gorst Coalition to secure federal and state resources and address the longstanding needs of the Gorst Corridor, a common route that connects travel to the entire Olympic Peninsula.

The State Route 3 and State Route 16 intersection in Gorst, WA that leads to SR 304 has long been a headache to the estimated 85,000 commuters who travel along the busy route to and from work around Sinclair Inlet.

Members of the Gorst Coalition recognized the urgent need to relieve severe traffic congestion, make needed safety improvements, provide resiliency from sea level rise and seismic events, support vital National Security objectives and reduce impacts on the Gorst Corridor ecosystem. Local 302 continues to be part of this coalition to improve the community and bring jobs to our membership.

Gorst SR3/SR16 Corridor project seeks to:

- Add an additional lane on SR 3 in each direction from Gorst SR3/ SR16 intersection to SR 304.
- Reinforce/rebuild the SR 3/SR 16 intersection within Gorst to address resiliency, safety, access,


and congestion.


- Connect local communities with non-motorized facilities to support safe bicycling and pedestrian access.
- Construct a Kitsap Park and Ride.

In 2022 the Washington State Legislature provided \$74.298 million to fund the initial critical design, environmental and cultural resources work necessary to build the Gorst project.

Local 302 will keep advocating for more funding to move this project forward.

State Route 3 Freight Corridor (Belfair Bypass)

or over 11 years Local 302 advocated to fund the Belfair Bypass, now known as the State Route (SR) 3 Freight Corridor project.

State Route 3 regularly experiences congestion during peak commute hours, especially as drivers stop and make turns. This heavy congestion has the potential to negatively affect emergency response times and economic vitality.

The SR 3 Freight Corridor would reduce congestion and improve safety through Belfair and provide an alternate route during highway closures. Construction of this project would provide safe and reliable regional access to jobs, goods, and services, and improve travel times for all public service providers.

The great news is in June 2019, the Washington State Legislature provided \$66.9 million to design and construct the SR 3 Freight Corridor, and another \$11.1 million in 2022. The total approved project funding is \$78 million. The total cost includes environmental, preliminary engineering, right-of-way acquisition, and construction.

This project will provide Local 302 members with work scheduled to start in 2026 and completed by 2028.

Construction Employment Hits Another Record

New data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) reported overall employment in construction grew by 25,000 jobs in September to reach 8,303,000 workers. **This is yet another new record for the most construction workers ever employed in the United States.** And it is another example of how the Biden-Harris administration is delivering for Operating Engineers.

Other highlights of BLS Jobs Report for September include:

- Employers added 254,000 jobs to their payrolls.
- The unemployment rate ticked down to 4.1% in September and has remained at its lowest levels in 50 years.

- Since the start of the Biden-Harris administration, 16.2 million jobs have been added to the U.S. economy.
- Over 740,00 construction jobs have been created since President Biden signed the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law in November 2021.
- Employers in the "heavy and civil engineering" subsector of the construction industry added 3,800 jobs to their payrolls, achieving a new employment record.

Additionally, since the start of the Biden-Harris administration, the economy has add 729,000 American manufacturing jobs. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law has awarded funding to over 60,000 new projects in communities throughout the nation.



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he Hanford Site, located in southeastern Washington state, was used to produce plutonium over a 40-year period, helping end World War II and playing a major role in the nation's defense efforts during the Cold War. As a result, 56 million gallons of radioactive and chemical waste are now stored in 158 underground tanks on the Hanford Site.

To address this challenge, the United States Department of Energy contracted Bechtel National Inc. to design and build the world's largest radioactive-waste treatment plant (WTP).

Since its inception over 20 years ago, crews at times of over 100 Local 302 members have been instrumental in the project growth providing:

- Excavation for all the buildings on site and for utilities at the Balance of Facilities (BOF)
- Thousands of crane "picks" varying from the largest of vessels to the heaviest of vault doors
- Repair facility and mobile mechanics, to assure all

equipment is inspected and repaired as needed

The Waste Treatment and Immobilization Plant, also known as the "Vit Plant", will use a process called vitrification to immobilize Hanford tank waste in glass. The glass form is stable and impervious to the environment. In this form, the waste's radioactivity will dissipate over hundreds to thousands of years.

he Port of Alaska is a critical transportation hub for the entire state. Interior Alaskan communities, military facilities, mining operations and rural Native Alaskan villages rely on the Port for consistent access to critical supplies. Food, consumer goods, building materials and cars all pass through the Port. Replacing existing Port facilities is key to ensuring the continued vitality of Alaska and ensures food security for Alaskans.

The foundations of the four terminals that make up the Port of Alaska have corroded and begun to split apart. Steel sleeves have been installed to help maintain their functionality, but they have a limited benefit.

The original terminals were constructed between the

late 1950s and 1970s and today, engineers estimate they will begin applying restrictions to Port operations by 2025 — sooner if there is a large earthquake.

The goal of the Port of Alaska's Modernization Program (PAMP) is to replace Anchorage's aging docks and allow the Port to continue its three critical functions:

- serve as Alaska's key inbound cargo gateway
- operate critical national defense infrastructure
- support the movement of consumer goods, industrial development and disaster recovery

PAMP will be funded through a combination of federal and state grants, Port of Alaska funds, and a potential tariff surcharge. At a cost of \$1.9 billion, the program is not yet fully funded.





Local 302 operators are key to port modernization

Local 302 members working for Manson Construction have been tasked with dredging and sheet pile removal on the North Extension Stabilization Step 1 (NES1).

Local 302 members working for Granite Construction have been tasked with support to Manson Construction by excavating behind the sheet piles and sloping the grade in NES1 to accommodate for armor rock and other material placement to prevent erosion.

A challenging environment

The Port of Alaska is strategically located adjacent to Alaska's population center and acts as the primary road, marine, air, rail, and pipeline cargo distribution system. While its location is ideal for supporting the movement of goods and services, the environment presents challenges for construction:

- Ice floes limit the in-water construction season to just six months per year, essentially doubling the number of construction seasons compared to a similar project in a warmer environment.
- With a range of almost 40 feet, the tides in Cook Inlet are the highest in the United States, creating swift currents and requiring a robust anchoring system for work vessels.
- The waterway is home to many marine mammals and fish, including the endangered Cook Inlet beluga whale, which requires special operations and restricts design flexibility and construction methods.
- Alaska is one of the most seismically active regions in the world and has more earthquakes than anywhere else in North America.



Bridging a rocky gap in Alaska's Denali National Park & Preserve

he Denali Park Road is a 92-mile-long out-and back road that heads west from the park entrance near Healy, Alaska to Kantishna, an outpost within the heart of Denali Park & Preserve. In the summer of 2021, a segment of the Denali Park Road through the Polychrome Pass area was cut off by the Pretty Rocks Landslide near Mile 45, preventing travel further west.

The complexity of the geology, climate, permafrost, and seismic hazards present a unique challenge for developing a solution to reopen the Denali Park Road and regain access to the stunning landscape.

The Polychrome Area Improvement Plan is an exciting and challenging \$207 million project that will restore access to remote areas of Denali National Park & Preserve that were cut off by the 2021 Pretty Rocks Landslide.

Working for general contractor Granite Construction, Local 302 operators and mechanics laid the literal groundwork for the construction of the 475-foot bridge; hauling gravel, conducting the earth works, and operating multiple staging areas. Working for drilling subcontractor DBM Contractors Inc. Local 302 members performed drilling services, making the rock anchors, soils, nails, and thermosyphons needed to make this geotechnically challenging project possible.

The majestic wilderness of Denali National Park & Preserve is a point of pride for Alaska and all Americans. The park sees hundreds of thousands of visitors a year and this bridge will restore access to some of the most popular destinations in the park.

Local 302 is proud of our operators and mechanics whose expertise has been crucial to the success of this project.

Ketchikan landslide


August 25, 2024 killed one person, injured three others, and destroyed multiple homes.

The landslide tore down a steep slope above the Third Avenue Bypass, crossing the road and continuing downhill. The slide sent a dense wave of snapped trees, toppled power poles and dirt crashing into a row of hillside homes.

Shout out to our Local 302 members Stew Meeks, Tim Webb, Corbin Cameron, Paul Julifs, Chuck Henderson, and Nick Taylor who were called in through the State of Alaska emergency declaration to help clean up the disaster.

Landslides like the one that occurred in Ketchikan can strike with little warning, sending earth and trees crashing down a mountainside as fast as a car on a highway.

The Ketchikan landslide was attributed to heavy rainfall, according to the National Weather Service in Juneau. Between 5 and 9 inches of rain fell in the higher elevations of the Ketchikan Range over the span





of about 30 hours, the weather service said. Ketchikan's average rainfall for the entire month of August is typically 8 inches.

Alaska is on the front lines of climate change, facing a rapidly changing climate as it is warming more than twice as fast as the planet as a whole, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association. Thinning glaciers, melting permafrost, warming oceans and less sea ice make it a frequent victim of floods and landslides.



By collecting and re-refining used oil, this closes the loop for the life cycle of oil. Using the re-refined oil minimizes the environmental impacts of our industries.

What are the top things you wish you would've known when you started your career?






